Animal Portraits

This workshop starts with a viewing of Kate Bergin's painting *The Alpaca's Tea Party* and discussion about all the animals and objects that Kate has painted. Afterwards children will move to the Gallery art space and create some animal portraits from the images provided or one of their own. Using pencils and pastels this workshop will introduce children to some techniques for capturing the body and textures of animals along with skills in using pastels effectively.

Precious Boxes

To coincide with the new exhibition *Opulence: luxury in early Bendigo homes* opening to the public on Friday 3 July at Post Office Gallery, children will begin this workshop learning about the many different types of boxes, such as jewellery boxes, snuff boxes and music boxes that people kept in their homes in the Victorian era. Children will then have the opportunity to create their own decorative box using embossing foil, metallic pens, costume jewels and other materials that shine. To complete the box children may like to add compartments inside or create some precious items to hide.

To begin the workshop children will view and discuss the very popular sculpture *Conjurer III* by Benjamin Armstrong found in the gallery collection. Like Armstrong, children will be encouraged to design their sculpture based on an exploration of the forms found in the plant world. Using wire, wool, sticks, raffia, felt and other fabrics this workshop is sure to be great fun and result in some very unique artworks.
