
Wow! Term 3 has been busy!!! Both Sydney and Warrnambool camps have come and gone with some great experiences and fun had by all of our students.

Warrnambool Camp 3rd - 5th September

After an early morning and a long bus ride, the group arrived in Warrnambool safe and ready for adventure! Day two soon dawned and our adventure continued on a road trip along the Great Ocean Road. We saw many scenic spots, with Lock Ard Gorge being a crowd favourite. In the afternoon the group split in to two with some horse riding on trails while others tried their luck fishing off the pier. Unfortunately there weren't enough fish caught for dinner, so the group went out for a beautiful meal at Images Restaurant in town. After dinner the group were treated to the Sound and Light Show at the Martine Museum, before heading back to base for one more nights .

Before heading home on the last day, the group visited Tower Hill, said hello to snakes and koalas, and participated in an Aboriginal Culture Tour to learn the history of the volcano and learnt how to throw a Boomerang.

Another long bus ride (with many sing-a-longs) saw the group home safe again (and miraculously, each footy came back too!)



Sydney Camp - 10th to 13th Sept

On Tuesday the 10th of September 17 of our young people from across the school flew to Sydney to participate in the biggest camp Doxa has ever run; 3 nights, 4 days interstate, catching public transport and walking all the way.

Lou's keen sense of direction meant that when it was time to catch a Ferry from Circular Quay, past the Opera House and under the Bridge to Darling Harbour, we got on the Ferry that goes in the exact opposite direction... the first and very best mistake made for the whole camp! The view we all shared of the Harbour as the sunset and the city lights illuminated the night skies was better than we could've hoped.

During the second day our feet carried us a whopping 20kms, up hill and down, through the Opera House and around Darling Harbour. I think every student who was with us on this day will forever refer to the Opera House steps as 'the double scoop steps' (the prize they got for not killing me for making them go up and then down again to find the entrance).

After our tour of the Opera House, we explored the Sea-Life Aquarium and Madame Tussauds and then while some with more stamina than others explored the Maritime Museum others went back to the hotel for a rest. Nick Lowes and Liam Lonergan get the Energizer Bunny award for camp. They simply did not stop! Every chance they had to participate in something they were in, no questions asked!

That afternoon we were joined by 3 more students and a couple of staff bringing our grand total to 20 students for the camp.

Throughout day 3 we spent the morning exploring the convict history of Cockatoo Island in the Harbour, listening to escape stories, exploring the sheds and tunnels on the island and trying our hardest not to lose an eye to the nesting seagulls that were EVERYWHERE and way worse than the magpies we get here.

The afternoon of day 3 saw us head to Bondi Beach for a few hours; everyone was thrilled to meet the Bondi Rescue guy in the ATV with the megaphone who helpfully re-enforced the meaning of the big yellow dangerous current signs directly in front of our group. We were then helpfully directed to down the beach where we could have a paddle in safety between the flags.

Our final day in Sydney was a travel day for us as we made our way to the airport and as we checked in discovered they had given our previously reserved seats to others. They managed to get almost everyone on the flight, leaving Lou to have a very peaceful sleep all by herself on the next flight home.

Thank you to all of our students who participated so keenly in this experience; we genuinely hope that there were new, exciting and valuable learning experiences in it for you all.
